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ECT Board of Directors Announcement!

The Elora Community Theatre playhouse and its kit and kaboodle are on the move! At an emergency board meeting of the Elora Community Theatre Executive, it was determined that in the best interest of our organization and membership that a tough decision needed to be made in regards to our financial situation and to prepare for the rough waters still to come.

President Deb Stanson reported to the Board of Directors, although we are currently in a plus situation financially, the COVID-19 Pandemic has played a *sinister* role over the past few months depleting dollars for rent and overhead with no opportunity to recoup expenses. Stanson stated, with no current production or opportunities in the near future to present live theatre; it is best that we look to find shelter elsewhere at hopefully little to no cost. Our organization will be able to maintain a frugal budget and keep our footlights on providing quality readings, virtual performances etc., but some large expenditures must be eliminated. With no need for a rehearsal space at this time, we can minimize our insurance premiums and focus on just storage space for the interim.

ECT is looking for an approximately 2000 square foot storage space for wardrobe, props and chattels available within the next month. The move from our current location in West Montrose is scheduled for early July. The Elora Community Theatre does have charitable status so if anyone has space available, rent can be offered as a tax write off.

Deb closed the meeting, but reflecting, we are best to have this discussion and act swiftly now. Like so many arts and cultural organizations, this has been a challenging time for all, but we will prevail, we always do!



Lis Pieper Memorial Award – Paul & Judy Faires

ECT would like to take some time to re-recognize and remember past winners of the Lis Pieper Memoria Award. This exemplary award was set up to honour those who have made outstanding contributions to local theatre in Centre Wellington and have exhibited Pieper's dedication to community theatre. Since their arrival in our town a little over 25 years ago, 2016 award winners Paul and Judy Faires, have become integral moving parts in the machinery of our local theatre community.

Their first involvement began in 1996 with the Not So Grand **Players** and relationship still exists to this day. While Paul was most noticeable strutting his stuff on stage, he also produced many of the NSGP plays as well as constructing and assembling sets and making outlandish props, much to the audiences' delight. Judy could be found



upstairs in the booth, manning light and sound as well as stage managing most of the productions. She created many costumes, some glamorous, some humorous, and became an expert at dyeing fabric for use and re-use. Their contribution to the success of more than 20 NSGP plays is enormous and Judy remains as treasurer of the group today.

In 2003, Paul became co-founder with Guy Haskell, of On The Spot Productions, a group specializing initially in murder mysteries and then in stage plays. Paul produced and acted, while Judy stage-managed and continued making costumes. It was this group that provided the theatre with the moving spotlight.

Lis Pieper Memorial Award – Paul & Judy Faires

Back in 1996, Judy became a paid employee of the Theatre on the Grand, working in the box office. These were difficult years for the theatre financially and Judy was told that she could no longer be paid for her services. In true Judy spirit, she said, "If I can't be paid, then I'll do the job as a volunteer." This began an undying commitment by these two people to maintaining the life and integrity of the Fergus Theatre. Over the years, they have painted changerooms and the stage floor (many times), replaced spongey floors, done general spring cleaning, washed and helped place stage lights and assisted in the facelift of the lobby. Judy still works in the box office and serves on occasion as House Manager as well as assisting the theatre administrator.



Both Paul and Judy are members of the Fergus Grand Theatre Volunteers, Judy as secretary, Paul as They both treasurer. organize and keep the stocked concession with supplies and they contribute the snacks and refreshments for the variety of lobby meetings gatherings that take place at the theatre. They also

decorate the lobby at special times such as Halloween and Christmas. These two spend so much time at the theatre that I wonder if they have sleeping bags and pillows stashed somewhere on the premises!

I don't know of many people who have worked so tirelessly in the background for so many years and have racked up hundreds of volunteer hours for the good of local theatre as Paul and Judy Faires.

No! Let fools make a virtue of constancy! All beautiful women have a right to our love, and the accident of being the first comer shouldn't rob others of a fair share in our hearts. As for me, beauty delights me wherever I find it and I freely surrender myself to its charms. No matter how far I'm committed – the fact that I am in love with one person shall never make me unjust to the others. I keep an eye for the merits of all of them and render each one the homage, pay each one the tribute that nature enjoins.

Come what may, I cannot refuse love to what I find lovable, and so, when a beautiful face is asking for love, if I had ten thousand hearts I would freely bestow every one of them. After all, there is something inexpressibly charming in falling in love and, surely, the whole pleasure lies in the fact that love isn't lasting. How delightful, how entrancing it is to lay liege with a hundred attentions to a young woman's heart; to see, day by day, how one makes slight advances; to pit one's exaltation, one's sighs and one's tears, against the modest reluctance of a heart unwilling to yield; to surmount, step by step, all the little barriers by which she resists; to overcome her proud scruples and bring her at last to consent.

But once one succeeds, what else remains? What more can one wish for? All that delights one in passion is over and one can only sink into a tame and slumbrous affection – until a new love comes along to awaken desire and offer the charm of new conquests. There is no pleasure to compare with the conquest of beauty, and my ambition is that of all the great conquerors who could never find it in them to set bounds to their ambitions, but must go on for ever from conquest to conquest. Nothing can restrain my impetuous desires. I feel it is in me to love the whole world, and like Alexander still wish for new worlds to conquer.


ECT Puzzle Pages


